Keynote Speaker: Michelle van Ryn, PhD, MPH, Grace Phelps Distinguished Endowed Professorship, Oregon Health & Science University

Steven Woolf, MD, Director Emeritus of the VCU Center on Society and Health



Dr. Michelle van Ryn currently holds the Grace Phelps Distinguished Endowed Professorship at Oregon Health & Science University. She previously served as the Director of the Research Program on Equity & Inclusion in Healthcare at Mayo Clinic in Rochester. Dr. van Ryn's research focuses primarily on the way "invisible actors," such as informal organization norms/diversity climate, implicit (unconscious) biases, inter-group anxiety and stereotype threat affect social interaction processes and decision-making.



Dr. Steven Woolf is the Director Emeritus of the VCU Center on Society and Health where he concentrates on public policy issues through his work on population health and social justice. Dr. Woolf, a Professor of Family Medicine and Population Health, has focused his career on raising public awareness about the social, economic, and environmental conditions that shape health and produce inequities. He is the lead author on the recently published study "Changes in midlife death rates across racial and ethnic groups in the United States: systematic analysis of vital statistics."
